# Green Shoots funding boost

Bega Valley Shire Council's *Green Shoots* post fire recovery program has received a welcome boost through a NSW Environmental Trust grant of \$84,560.

The *Green Shoots* program has been run since the Tathra and District Bushfire in March 2018 and has focussed on healing both the local community and the fire affected environment through restoration events that everyone can participate in.

To date the program has run 11 restoration projects/events, attended by over 500 community volunteers.

Council's Environmental Management Officer, Andrew Morrison, said the grant will allow Council to continue working with the community to help restore the Tathra environment that

means so much to us all.

"The grant will enable us to focus on weed control to allow natural regeneration, along with native vegetation planting and workshops," Mr Morrison said.

The latest Green Shoots activity saw 120 Year 9 students from Bergmann Anglican College in Canberra helping to remove plant guards and weeds and plant over 400 endemic native plants at the Tathra Headland while on their annual camp with local business CoastLife Adventures.

"As part of this excursion CoastLife and the school wanted to give something back to the local community, so volunteering to be part of the Green Shoots program was a real win win," Mr Morrison said.

"We even ended up downing tools and heading down to the wharf to see whales pass close by on several occasions - the kids (and teachers) were stoked."

There will be more Green Shoots activities to come over the next two years.





# New terminal in action

The Merimbula Airport terminal extension project is moving into the final stages, with a live transition into the upgraded terminal building successfully undertaken on Friday, 1 November.

Bega Valley Shire Council's Project Manager, Jenny Symons, said the transition was very smooth thanks to the work of the airport management, Regional Express, Joss Construction and Council's own work teams from Bega, Eden and Merimbula.

"We are very excited that the travelling public are now able to enjoy the added comfort and improved facilities the new terminal brings," Ms Symons said.

"The final touches to the building will continue for the next few weeks. They include external signage, sun shades, flight information displays, televisions, tourism displays, art installations and some additional seating, while the meeting room (holding up to six people) will be ready for public bookings by the middle of December.

"The users of the airport have been incredibly understanding of the disruptions to parking and the use of the temporary terminal building, which significantly reduced the project timeframe.

"Among the features of the new terminal are enlarged seating areas, significant improvements to the cafe, upgraded staff amenities, an external seating area with access to the cafe and the separation of incoming and departing passengers, along with climate control measures such as environmentally friendly instantaneous heating and fan driven ventilation."

An upgrade to the short stay carpark around the terminal (that commenced on Monday, 4 November) represents the final stage of this significant project, with short-term measures necessary to facilitate this.



A successful live transition into the upgraded Merimbula Airport terminal took place on Friday, 1 November, with the travelling public now able to enjoy the added comfort and improved facilities the new terminal brings.

"The main entrance is closed, and two temporary entrances have been activated – one for hire cars only and the other for all other traffic," Ms Symons said.

Signage has been installed on site to direct airport users, however with fewer spaces available while the work is carried out it would be helpful and very much appreciated if the public, where possible, can use other options such as drop offs, bus services and the privately-owned secure parking on site rather than the short-stay parking.

## On the roads

#### **Gravel re-sheeting**

Council plans to undertake gravel re-sheeting works on Reedy Swamp and Peak Hill Roads in the coming weeks.

Weather permitting the work will be carried out on the 2.4km stretch of Reedy Swamp Road (up to the Vimy Ridge intersection) from 19 - 29 November and on the 700 metres from the start of Peak Hill Road from 25 - 29 November.

The projects will include drainage improvement, vegetation maintenance and road rehabilitation, and water trucks will be operating throughout the working days to reduce dust from the construction. Traffic control will be in place for the duration of the project.

#### **West Kameruka**

Works are well underway along West Kameruka Road, with vegetation management, road formation works, replacement of drainage structures and batter repairs all nearing completion.

In the next few weeks heavy stabilisation equipment will commence renewing the existing pavement and preparing the surface for an initial bitumen seal in early December.

The project will see the final 8km of unsealed road upgraded to a minimum 8m wide sealed pavement, with additional features including new guardrail, signage and a wide centreline treatment.

Sealing the road will not only improve the driveability and safety for road users, but also provide much relief to local residents from dust generated by traffic.

Works are scheduled for completion in February 2020.

# Climate resilience strategy on exhibition

The draft Bega Valley Shire Climate Resilience Strategy 2050 is on public exhibition until 16 December 2019 in public libraries, Council offices and on the *Have Your Say* page of Council's website.

Council is calling for comments and suggestions on the draft strategy, which puts forward a resilience approach to addressing the projected impacts of climate change across the Bega Valley Shire.

Council's Director Community, Environment and Planning, Alice Howe, said the strategy is about local actions everyone can take to ensure the Shire is well placed to respond to climate-related challenges now and into the future.

"This is about working together to make our community strong: it links to our environment, our economy and our communities," Dr Howe said.

"Resilience is about building strong foundations for our Shire to respond to challenges and seize opportunities. That could be through early adaptation or developing new industries and technologies that create jobs and benefit all residents," she said.

The draft strategy sets out seven areas of response:



The climate resilience strategy is about local actions everyone can take to ensure the Shire is well placed to respond to climate-related challenges now and into the future.

- Protecting our natural systems
- Preparing for natural hazards
- Liveable and connected places
- Safe, healthy and inclusive communities
- Diverse and Thriving economies
- Energy security
- Food security

Across these areas, the document identifies areas of vulnerability and risk, ideas for local actions across

the Shire, and a vision for success by 2050.

"We have put forward some ideas for activities and hope to generate many more local actions during the public exhibition period that recognise the role we all can play in creating a climate resilient future.

"Partnerships will be key to our success. We really encourage everyone to think about what they

can do to contribute. Our final strategy will be a blueprint for a resilient Bega Valley Shire," Dr Howe said.

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# Endangered plant survey undertaken

In mid-October Bega Valley Shire Council coordinated an endangered plant survey through some of the bushfire impacted bush around Tathra as part of the *Green Shoots* Bushfire Recovery Program.

Community volunteers joined Council staff; Senior Save our Species officer Rod Armstrong; members of the Atlas of Life in the Coastal Wilderness (ALCW); and several local botanists to search for Matted Bush-pea (Pultenaea pedunculata), a low growing native plant with small yellow flowers that is found in only three populations in NSW.

Prior to this survey there were only a couple of records of Matted Bush-Pea in the Tathra area. However, following the March 2018 Tathra and District Fire, Council staff had noticed a large amount of germination of this species in several areas around Tathra.

With the plants coming into flower in October/ November the timing was right to see how widely the Matted Bush-pea was distributed.

The survey targeted four areas to the west of

Tathra and along the Kianinny Walking Track. In total over 400 Matted Bush-pea plants were

Local entomologist, Kerri-Lee Harris, managed to

photograph a native bee pollinating some of the plants, further increasing knowledge of Matted Bush-pea ecology.

Council's Environmental Management Officer, Andrew Morrison, said the survey was a great opportunity for community members to be involved in collecting valuable scientific data that will be directly used in the conservation of this endangered species.

"It was fantastic to have so many kids come along for the survey - they are really enthusiastic and have good eyes for finding things like small plants," Mr Morrison said.

"Seeing how well this endangered plant responds to fire really adds weight to getting more of the indigenous community back onto country and incorporating more cultural burning into the landscape."

Following the strong post fire regeneration of the Matted Bush-pea there are plans to undertake trial burns to better understand the relationship between fire and germination of Matted Bush Pea seed.

# **Council Meeting**

#### **Recovery Support Service**

An independent evaluation of the of the Bega Valley Shire Council's **Bushfire Recovery Support Service** for Tathra and District and Yankees Gap District was presented for the information of Councillors and the community.

The report provides some useful insights into some of the issues the service faced at the time and how it could be improved and replicated.

The report will also be utilised to develop a Recovery Support Service model to improve access to recovery services and resilience during and after future similar disaster events.

#### **Ocean Outfall**

Following extensive consultation and research, Council has unanimously resolved to construct the proposed Merimbula Ocean Outfall on a northern alignment 2.6 kilometres out to sea and 30 metres underwater, providing a sustainable disposal option to return treated wastewater back to the environment when it cannot be reused.

In addition, the decision was made to treat the water to a higher

standard including an additional sand filtration step, further phosphorous removal and UV disinfection.

#### **Popularly Elected Mayor**

A motion to hold a constitutional referendum at the 2020 Council elections proposing "That the Bega Valley Shire Council Mayor be elected by the electors" was defeated.

#### **Tura Beach Country Club**

As Crown Land Manager of Reserve (R95834) Council has approved a further 20-year lease to the Tura Beach Country Club Limited, for their continued occupation of the Tura Beach golf course land, for an annual market rental as determined by a registered valuer.

#### **Bega Indoor Sports Stadium**

Council has approved a further twoyear licence agreement with an option for a further year to fLiNG Physical Theatre Incorporated for

their continued occupation of the Bega Indoor Sports Stadium for an annual rental fee as determined by a formal market valuation and increased annually by CPI.

# Solar installed at the workshop

Refurbishment works to the Bega Valley Shire Council workshop and stores building have recently been completed.

As part of these works the redundant electrical system was removed and replaced with a new compliant system.

The new electrical system now consists of LED lights, which will reduce the electrical usage compared to the old industrial halogen high bay lights. To aid with the lighting, transparent sheeting was also placed on the roof to provide more natural light into the building.

The biggest modification to the electrical system was the installation of a 30kW solar system and the allowances made in the switchboard.

The switchboard now has the capacity for an upgraded 80-90kW solar system to essentially transform the workshop building into a mini solar power plant, which will then produce enough power to make the Maher Street depot energy neutral through the day.

This will provide substantial cost saving to Council in the reduction of electricity bills and the exporting of

unused solar energy back into the grid.

The initiative is a part of Council's Clean Energy Plan and represents a continuation of Council's long-term commitment to the environment.

This large clean energy project

will also make an important contribution to reducing our overall carbon footprint.

The building itself was given a face lift with new wall and roof cladding replacing the old deteriorated cladding from when the building

was originally constructed.

Almost all of the materials that were removed from the workshop during the demolition works have been recycled by the local contractor with very minimal waste being taken to landfill.

#### **Environment focus at Wyndham**

Bega Valley Shire Council staff were delighted to see so many Wyndham locals attend the Community Environment Day on Wednesday, 6 November.

Restoration of Mataganah Reserve was a high priority for the community and some of the speakers on the day provided insights into how this could be successfully achieved.

The presenters included Les Kosez from Eden LALC who explained the cultural significance of the reserve; Kylie Ryan from Council's Biosecurity and Invasive Species team speaking on biosecurity weeds; Chris Post from Landcare, who provided insights into the role of volunteers; and Council's Natural Assets Officer, Jess O'Brien, speaking on management structure

and reserve vegetation.

Local community member Derek Lewis also provided some perspectives on environmental management strategies for the Wyndham area.

Following the discussions and workshops and some lunch in the hall, participants moved to the Mataganah Reserve for a tree planting session with Wyndham Primary School.

This was the second community environment day convened by Bega Valley Shire Council - a similar day having been held in Kiah in July.

# Weapons for the Soldier to open

A new exhibition featuring some of Australia's most important Indigenous and non-Indigenous artists will open at the Bega Valley Regional Gallery (BVRG) on 15 November.

Weapons for the Soldier brings together 41 important artists who have made new work to examine complex and varied responses to weaponry, warfare, and their connection to protecting land and country.

Twenty-seven of the artists are from the art centres of the Anangu Pitjantjatjara Yankunyjatjara (APY) Lands of central Australia, while the 14 invited artists are some of Australia's most important Indigenous and non-Indigenous artists (including Ben Quilty, George Gittoes, Shaun Gladwell, Alex Seton, Jonathan Jones and Danie Mellor).

Weapons for the Anangu Soldier is a subject that senior APY artist Ray Ken has explored in his paintings throughout his career. With his permission and encouragement, along with the support of other senior men who often paint weapons and stories of conflict, the young Indigenous artists have explored what it means to be a soldier today and to fight to protect your land and culture.

BVRG Director, Iain Dawson, said fighting for Country and a deep connection to Country are recurrent themes that are explored throughout the exhibition, evocative of both the broader tenets of the ANZAC legacy and the distinct position of Indigenous people within Australia.

"The exhibition and these vitally important themes have resonated with audiences across Australia and we are very much looking forward to dialogue being fostered here in the Bega Valley," Mr Dawson said.

"Those attending the exhibition will experience works

that promote conversations around multi-geographical and multigenerational fights for land, Country and freedom experienced by Australians, both Indigenous and non-Indigenous, as well as the Indigenous experience in Australian military history."

Weapons for the Soldier will be officially opened at 6pm on Friday, 15 November and will run through until 8 February 2020.



## Panboola Pomaderris planting



The planting of the threatened Pomaderris bodalla at the Panboola Wetlands is part of a project led by the Australian National Botanic Gardens.

Council staff joined community volunteers to plant out the rare and threatened Pomaderris bodalla at the Panboola wetlands on 10 October.

It is a shrub with cream coloured flowers that occurs in a couple of spots around our Shire, including along the foreshore in Merimbula.

The plants used had been grown from cuttings and seed collected more than a year ago from the Council-managed Merimbula foreshore reserve and grown up by the Australian National Botanic Gardens (ANBG) in Canberra.

The community planting was part of a project led by the ANBG in collaboration with Bega Valley Shire Council, the NSW Department of Planning, Industry and Environment and community groups.

The three-year project funded by the NSW Environment Trust aims to conserve rare Pomaderris species. with community groups, such as the Panboola volunteers, playing a key role in custodianship and looking after these rare and special plants.

## **Celebrating Children's Week**

"The intention is to bring local representatives of business, employees and future job seekers together to understand priorities and generate ideas on how locals can fill the kinds of jobs that are required in our local economy now and into the future," Ms Vandenbergh said.

The Western Research Institute (WRI), that is working with Council on the project and will be running the workshops, has also designed a business survey and interview schedule.

CEO, Kathy Woolley, said WRI will be using technology to assist in capturing all the ideas from workshop participants in both Bega and Eden.

"This means we will have a list of ideas and participants will have voted on them to gauge which ones are supported. It is an easy process and only requires the use of your smart phone, tablet or laptop," Ms Woolley said.

## Mirror and Me screening success

It's not easy making a short film in just a few days but six young local women aged 12-16 years - Isobel, Olivia, Taylor, Amalia-Grace, Jada and Maddison – have done just that, it's an awesome achievement!

Their film called *Mirror and Me* had its first screening recently as part of the Far South Film film night at The Picture Show Man Cinema and the film explores themes around fitting in, self-esteem and the need to recognise and understand your own unique value.

The talented group wrote, costumed, scouted locations, acted in and filmed the work during a two-day workshop called 'Girls in Media', facilitated by Lis Shelley from Stage Flight and organised by the Women's Resource Centre in Bega.

The workshop was about teaching young women the skills to get a message out into the community using tools that were already available to them - their mobile phones or tablets.

Lis encouraged the group to think about film as a medium for speaking out about issues that were important to them – giving them a voice.

With the raw footage in hand, some of the young women experimented on their own version of the edit. The final edit of the film brings together all their contributions – including some original ukelele music by Maddison in the soundtrack.

"It was a really fun experience and it taught me new skills. It was great to see everyone's ideas put together," Maddison said.

The participants also gained experience in brainstorming ideas, developing a 'message', planning projects, sourcing resources, costuming and acting.

## Preparing for potential bushfires

In mid-October, Bega Valley Shire Council partnered with the Rural Fire Service (RFS) to offer the residents of Thompsons Drive in Tathra and Barragga Bay an opportunity to better prepare their properties for potential bushfires.

Council ran a free bushfire hazard vegetation clean-up day for residents of these two areas, with residents encouraged to reduce the fire hazard on their properties by pruning and removing shrubs and vegetation close to their homes.

Piles of vegetation were brought to the roadside and contractors were



engaged to mulch this material. The resulting mulch was made available to the residents for free.

Thompsons Drive was chosen as it was impacted by the 2018 bushfire and the community have recently undertaken Community Protection Plan workshops with the RFS, while Barragga Bay carries the highest level of bushfire risk of any community in the Shire.





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## Solar-powered traffic lights in use

As part of its drive to reduce its carbon footprint, Council's works section have been using solar-powered traffic lights when carrying out road works at various locations across the Shire.

Although only a relatively small contribution to emissions reduction, the use of solar-powered traffic lights is a marked improvement for the environment when compared to engine powered lights that we have previously used. An unintended benefit has been the quiet running in urban areas allowing earlier starts when needed.

The lights are also very cost

effective and safer due to eliminating the need for fuel and are also easier to handle on site with no engine or bulky fuel tank.

Council's Sealed Roads Team Leader, Greg Cusack, said these lights are easy to manoeuvre into position and there's no need to mess about with fuel throughout the day.

"We can set them up and leave them knowing they won't run out during the working day," Mr Cusack

The lights can be set up to cover a length of up to 1km and have recommended wait times programmed for motorists.

# Rabbit control trial

Bega Valley Shire Council has partnered with South East Local Land Services (LLS) to undertake a rabbit control trial at Merimbula's Short Point.

Short Point was chosen for the trial due its status as a regional attraction and the noticeable impacts the rabbit population is having on the native vegetation and recreation reserve.

The trial program will include a series of free feeding evenings and population monitoring, before the newest strain (K5) of the Rabbit Haemorrhagic Disease Virus (RHDV) - formerly Calicivirus is released.

This will guarantee the target species is being lured and ensure there is adequate uptake of the bait - in turn increasing the effectiveness of the release.

RHDV, which causes fatal haemorrhagic disease in the European rabbit (Oryctolagus cuniculus) has been chosen for the trial due to its targeted nature and long-term biological establishment, whereby the virus will continue to live in this community of rabbits and re-emerge naturally when seasonal variances allow it to.

Council's Recreation Assets Officer, Ed Crothers, said the trial represents the first step in a staged approach by Council to improve rabbit management, with effective pest control often demanding a mix of techniques applied in sequence over time.

they own and manage; therefore, we have an obligation to manage these populations," Mr Crothers said.

"Council is developing a management plan for the control of rabbits across the Shire, and this trial will enable some targeted monitoring to measure the effectiveness of this control.

"Ongoing monitoring of the rabbit population will continue after the trial to inform the development and implementation of further controls across the Shire.

"We are very appreciative of the support, expertise and guidance LLS is providing us in this endeavour," Mr Crothers said.

Being a very specific species control, RDHV has never been found to cause infection in any other animal except the European rabbit.

Dog owners frequenting Short Point with their animals are encouraged to ensure there is no disturbance to feeding stations during the trial however.

## **Spinifex - key to dune stability**

Spinifex (*Spinifex sericeus*) can be seen along the front of dunes at most beaches within the Bega Valley and is a key species for dune stability.

It is often one of the first species to colonise dunes with its strong, rope like roots able to fix onto the sand.

Growing in clumps known as tussocks, it is able to withstand tough conditions including salt spray and windblown sand, helping dune formation by trapping sand.

Plants have both a male and female flowerhead, the male flowerheads are brown clusters of flowers with the female flowerheads consisting of a ball like cluster of spikelets (shown in image).

These flower heads detach from the main plant when mature and act like a tumbleweed being blown along beaches.

See if you can spot this species when you are next down the beach!



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
